6. Governance, Leadership and Management

Being a women's college, it aims at empowering the girls socially and professionally so that they can make the best possible choices of their future.

- Catering to institutional as well as individual requirements through instinctive understanding, perception and novel ideas.
- Going beyond the set standard limits through persistent work, careful planning and unwearied efforts.

- Provision of holistic education to the students which can help in instilling traditional and modern values.
- Enhancing the entrepreneurial skills of women by providing them need based and job oriented programmes through courses like Cosmetology and Design.
- Enhancing participative, competitive and constructive environment.
- Familiarizing women with Indian Vedic tradition and Culture through different programmes.
- Instilling a feeling of discipline, dedication and social service that would contribute to a better nation building.

6.2 Does the Institution have a management Information System?

The institution is endowed with a co-operative and a participative management which aids in the provision of information and decision-making process. The directions given by the DAV College Managing Committee, New Delhi are implemented by the various administrative offices under the leadership and guidance of the Principal.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

While developing the curriculum, new programmes and courses are devised. Feedback from all stake holders is also taken into consideration at the time of developing the curriculum. Once the curriculum is drawn up, it is discussed in the meetings of Board of Studies and faculty meetings of the affiliating university so as to encourage new programmes according to their current market demands.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- The faculties of each department hold a meeting at the beginning of the academic session for division of syllabus and contents for the mid-term semester tests and for preparing a teaching module of that session. Activity calendar of the department for the current session is also devised and discussed.

- To enlighten students on diverse aspects of knowledge, Seminars and guest lectures are organised by different departments.
- Air conditioned library, a reading room, a multi activity room and smart class rooms are provided to students.
- Students are given various tasks like report writing, press release, recording so as to enhance their creative skills.
- To provide additional help to the students, extra classes are taken by the faculty in their free periods, Sundays as well as winter break.
- To make teaching learning milieu interactive and entertaining, a number of modern and facilitative teaching aids such as projectors, CD players, computers, smart boards, tutorials, remedial coaching, audio visual aids are used.
- Students of English department are shown films based on the texts prescribed in their syllabus in the Language Lab.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Mid-term tests are conducted regularly before the final semester examination of the university.
- The answer scripts of the Mid-term tests are shown to the students so as to familiarize them with their flaws and encourage them to work hard.
- Class tests are taken regularly.
- An evaluation centre of GNDU has been set up in our college by the university for marking of answer scripts.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- Research projects are applied to and taken by the faculty of various departments.
- The institution provides ample space and infrastructure support to the faculty for their research work.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Automation of the library service has been initiated through OPAC.
- Availability of internet service in the college.
- PG Departments of college have separate departmental libraries that ensure an easy access to books.
- The college has access to e-journals and e-books through NLIST programme.
- Latest books and journals are subscribed to and purchased every year.
- The institution has made various ICT resources available to its staff and students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college managed human resources in the manner given below:

- Incentives in the form of prizes and fee concessions are given to the students so as to keep the spirit of healthy competition alive among them. 650 prizes and an amount of Rs. 2,801,558 has been allotted in the form of fee concession.
- To improve the academic results, university results are reviewed.
- New methods of teaching are adopted so as to develop a healthy and an interesting learning atmosphere.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The college made 130 appointments on adhoc basis. Besides, 32 members were recruited on contractual basis. The recruitment of these posts is done through a proper channel. The posts are advertised in reputed national and regional newspapers. The applications are invited from eligible candidates satisfying UGC/GNDU norms. The staff is selected on merit. The contractual staff is recruited by DAV College Managing Committee, New Delhi while the Ad hoc staff is recruited at the college level by Selection Committee.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- An excursion to Virasat Haveli was organized by Department of Tourism on 30th Jan. 2016 where the rich culture of Punjab is well depicted in the ambience and hospitality of haveli.
- A Heritage Walk of Amritsar was organized by Department of Tourism on 30th Jan. 2016 to promote the rich cultural heritage of Amritsar. The students were taken to 12 heritage points including the old walled city. They also visited Virasat Haveli to discover rural, tourism and got an opportunity to explore the vibrant character of 400 years' old history of Amritsar.
- One week educational trip to Jaipur-Delhi was organized by Department of Design from 6th-11th Feb, 2016. The students of BD Foundation Sem-II visited Jaipur, Dargah of Ajmer Sharif and Pushkar. In Delhi, they visited the house of Indira Gandhi, the former Indian Prime Minister & the National Museum.
- Educational trip to Jaipur was organized by PG Department of Fashion Designing and Home Science from 19th to 23rd Feb 2016. 52 students, along with three teachers, visited Cheer Sagar Garment Export House and Krishna Textiles. - Market survey was conducted for students of M.Sc. Fashion Design and Merchandising, Sem-I on 25th July 2015. Students surveyed the colours, fabric textures, and silhouettes of kids wear trends in the market. These market trends were implemented by the students while creating their collections.

- Fluorescent tubes instead of incandescent bulbs are used.
- Compact fluorescent lamps (CFL) have been installed.
- Solar thermal devices are used for effective conservation of renewable energy.
- In non-reading and non-working areas, reduced lighting (25 watts- 40 watts) is used.
- Trees and medicinal plants are added.

- Active initiative was taken in the upkeep of the terrace garden in the Science Block.
- One storage tank has been made available and five bore wells have been dug for storage and ground water recharging of BD block and Hostel building.
- Rain water of main building is collected in the storage tank for multipurpose uses under rain water harvesting schema.
- Waste chemicals in the chemistry labs are properly disposed off by dissolving them in water or by keeping them separately in protected sheets.
- Heavy waste furniture and drama sets are sent to the workshop for dismantling and recycling or re-using.

- University toppers are provided with facilities, such as, full fee concession, issuance of books from the library as per requirement of students for the whole session.
- Sportspersons are given incentives, such as, fee concession, free hostel and free mess facility, free diet (daily juice, fruit salad and milk), free medical facility, free bus facility, free kit, free equipment, cash prizes (ranging between Rs 25,000/- to Rs. 35,000), free books to the needy players and TA/DA worth Rs. 75000/- to national and international players.

7.4 Contribution to environmental awareness / protection

The college adopts environment friendly practices and takes necessary steps such as energy conservation, rain water harvesting, waste recycling, carbon neutral etc.

Energy Conservation

- Most of the doors, windows in computer Labs have been thermally sealed and are kept closed on entry/exit to maintain the required temperature.
- Members of Faculty, Student Council and Discipline Committee remain vigilant to check the wastage of electrical energy by ensuring that lights and fans are switched off in the classrooms or laboratories when not required.
- Computers, printers, copiers etc., which are not in use, are switched off and disconnected at the end of the day.
- Fluorescent tubes instead of incandescent bulbs are used.
- Compact fluorescent lamps (CFL) have already been installed.
- Electronic equipment and gadgets are shut off during non-working hours.
- Split units in all Labs and central ACs in Auditorium and Labs have been installed which are compatible to the occupancy level.
- All the office windows are covered with blinds or curtains to reduce heat conduction.
- Unit settings for all ACs are at 22-25°C.
- All transformers are disconnected when not in use.

- Lights are switched off immediately when not required.
- 4 automatic pump controllers have been installed in hostel building.
- The college is gradually switching over to energy efficient LED lights. 100 LED lights have been installed in Computer Labs, College Campus, Seminar and Conference Hall.
- For outdoor lighting, high pressure sodium or metal LED lamps are used.

Use of Renewable Energy

- Solar thermal devices are used for effective conservation of renewable energy.
- The following devices have been installed in the college as an alternative to electrical appliances:
 - Four solar water heaters in hostel
 - Eight solar lights in campus

Water Harvesting

- In the playground, rain water percolates through the soil.
- Rain water of main building is collected in the storage tank and also enters the borewell for ground water recharging.
- One storage tank has been made available and eight bore wells have been dug for storage and ground water recharging of BD block, Hostel Building, Main Building and Sports Hostel.
- The water of Commerce Block enters the borewell for recharging of ground water.

Carbon Neutrality

- The greenhouse gas emission has been reduced by encouraging the employees and students to pool their conveyances.
- The college has invested in green technologies such as solar power, biodegradable, water harvesting to reduce its carbon footprint.
- Plantation of trees has been increased to sequester CO₂ emitted in the atmosphere. About twenty plants of species such as Neem, Amla and Gulmohar have been planted.

Plantation

- A terrace garden has been developed outside the Science Block of the college. It has different varieties of ornamental plants.
- The garden and kitchen waste of the college is converted into vermicompost and then utilized as a natural fertilizer in the area near BD Department.
- A herbal garden having different varieties of medicinal plants has been developed in the college.
- The college has planted about 1000 ornamental and seasonal plants in the campus.
- The college has an organic vegetable patch in the first lawn opposite to Commerce Block which is free of chemical fertilizers and pesticides.

Hazardous Waste Management

- Students of the Departments of Design use leftover pieces of fabric to make utility items and jewellery pieces.
- Heavy waste furniture and drama sets used in different activities of the college are sent to the workshop for dismantling and recycling or re-using.
- Waste chemicals in the chemistry labs are properly disposed of by dissolving them in water or by keeping them separately in protected sheets.
- Students of the Departments of Fine Arts use waste material like bottles papers cardboard etc. to create pieces of art.
