<p>Department of Commerce and Business Administration organized Interactive Sessions, workshops, seminars and guest lectures</p>	<p>? A special workshop on Stock Market Concepts was organized on 1st September 2023 for B.Voc (Banking) Sem-I. The workshop was conducted by Mr Nikhil. The students got live exposure to see online trading of shares through Zerodha broking application in stock exchange. In this workshop students learnt about sale and purchase of shares, overview of Zerodha Application like how to see charts, fundamentals of companies, how to add funds through bank account, how to place sale and purchase order and how to cancel order. Total Number of Students present was 17. ? A guest lecture on Personal Finance Strategies was organized on 20th September, 2023. This course enables graduates to secure occupation as Area Manager, District Manager, Brand Manager, HR Manager, Retail Buyer, Sales Executive, Travel Agent etc. B.Voc (Banking and Financial Services): It has immense scope of absorbing technically trained Probationary Officers, Financial Investment Advisor, and Financial Analyst etc. After studying this innovative programme, students will have ample career opportunities in this field as a: Financial Investment Advisor, Wealth Management Officer at Banks, Banking Operations Staff as PO (Probationary Officer), Financial Analyst, Portfolio Manager, Mutual Fund Manager, Stock Broker. B.Voc (Cosmetology): This course is framed to prepare the students to have well-paid jobs in beauty parlour, lounge and saloons. Students may act as fitness instructors, gym trainers and yoga trainers. B.Voc (Theatre and Stagecraft): The course mainly focuses on the production techniques used in live theatre & film industry. It covers theatrical skills, acting, direction, stagecraft, performing arts. B.Voc (Fashion Technology): This course imparts a cohesive

amalgamation of modern and conventional learning techniques, and also prepare the students for various jobs in apparel industry, as well as for self-employment. Add-on courses: Computer Graphics & Animation Communication Skills Cosmetology Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications Anchoring, Reporting & News Reading French Interior Decoration Office Management & Secretarial Practices Food Preservation c) The students are motivated to work for the nation by joining NSS and NCC units of the college, NSS has its motto, 'Not Me But You' means it teaches the students to work for society. NCC students are trained to fight for the nation. Moreover, our college celebrates different national and international days. In the college, it is compulsory for each and every student to attend the "Havan Yajna" for at least 3 days in a session. d) I Our affiliating university has approved the credit structure in its affiliated colleges during forthcoming session i.e 2024-25. We have been following the same during the session. II The college invites resource persons from the industry to impart the vocational skills to the students. III At present our college is running vocational education via offline mode. The college is capable of offering these courses on ODL/blended mode, once the affiliating university allows us. The college has established a robust system for curriculum delivery under the supervision of the Dean Academics. At the outset of each academic session, faculty from all departments meet to distribute syllabus content, schedule in-house tests, and design teaching modules for the term. At the beginning of the academic year, faculty members familiarize students with the study plan and reading materials for their courses. They recommend textbooks, reference materials, and, where necessary, provide supplementary notes. Approximately 80% of the syllabus is covered before the in-house tests, with the remaining portion completed between the tests and the final examinations. Answer scripts from mid-term tests are returned to students, enabling them to identify and address their weaknesses.

The college also ensures the integration of ICT tools into the teaching process, offering facilities like PowerPoint presentations, smart boards, and audiovisual aids to enhance

classroom engagement. Additionally, students are encouraged to utilize a range of resources, including books, e-journals, and online materials available through the NPTEL portal and the library, to support and deepen their learning experience.

A separate block dedicated to design includes facilities such as a Textile Lab, a Fashion Lab, an Interior Lab, a Studios, a Shoppe, a Dark Room, a Video Production Studio, an Audio Production Studio, a Still Photography Lab and Studio, Art Galleries, Multimedia Labs, a Jewellery Studio and Manufacturing Lab, a Seminar Room, Open-Air Theatre, a Hi-tech Language Lab, an Aviation Lab, and an aesthetically designed Cosmetology Labs. The college provides hostel accommodation for up to 500 students. Its library operates on an open-access system and offers reprographic facilities. There are spacious reading rooms exclusively for students. The college's auditorium, Urvi, with a seating capacity of 1200, serves as the hub for academic, co-academic, and cultural activities such as conferences, orientation camps, and annual functions. Furthermore, the college is equipped

with an Indoor Stadium, a Swimming pool, an Indoor Gym, and an Outdoor Gym to meet the needs of sportswomen.

The college functions under a hierarchical governance structure. At the apex, the DAV College Managing Committee (DAVCMC) in New Delhi oversees the institution's overall operations. Locally, the Local Managing Committee, headed by the Chairman, supervises academic planning and developmental initiatives.

Within the college, administrative responsibilities are led by the Principal, supported by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Additional administrative roles are managed by the Deans, the Hostel Warden, the Superintendents of the General Office and Accounts Office, and the Estate Officer. Academic decisions are overseen by the Heads of Departments (HODs).

A variety of societies, clubs, and committees, composed of teaching and non-teaching staff as well as students, organize academic, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities. The college strictly adheres to the rules and regulations set by the University Grants Commission (UGC), the Department of Public Instruction (Colleges) of the Government of Punjab, Guru Nanak Dev University (GNDU) in Amritsar, and DAVCMC, New Delhi, in matters of promotions, appointments, and service rules.

For filling vacant grant-in-aid faculty positions and posts in self-financed courses, DAVCMC advertises and oversees the selection process. Contractual faculty appointments for one year

are made by a college-level panel appointed by DAVCMC, adhering to established norms. Vacancies in non-teaching and support staff positions are filled at the college level in compliance with guidelines from DAVCMC and the Department of Public Instruction (Colleges), Government of Punjab.

A sub-committee, the CAS Committee, appointed by the Principal, is responsible for verifying, validating, and forwarding the faculty's performance appraisals to the appropriate authority. Temporary and part-time staff members who demonstrate exceptional performance are considered for reappointment in the following academic year.

To ensure financial accountability, the college conducts regular internal and external financial audits.

Internal financial audits:

The college offers several self-financed courses in addition to government-aided courses. The budget for self-financed courses is approved by the local committee and then by the parent governing body, DAVCMC, New Delhi. Additionally, the accounts for self-financed courses are reconciled annually in June at DAVCMC, New Delhi. Moreover, the parent body, DAVCMC, New Delhi, sanctions all expenditures on major projects.

External financial audits:

External financial audits involve the two distinct categories:

External audit of funds received from the Government of Punjab:

The Government of Punjab oversees external audits of government funds at two key levels:

- Finance Department of the Government of Punjab
- Accountant General DPI (Colleges)

Additionally, funds designated for SC/ST students undergo scrutiny by either the Finance Department or a government-appointed committee. Furthermore, the DPI (Colleges) conducts compliance audits to verify adherence to administrative rules, leave rules, recruitment rules, and payments to retired faculty/staff.

External audit of funds received from national funding agencies:

Chartered Accountant audits the utilization of funds received from government funding agencies such as the UGC, DST, and DBT. The audited Utilization Certificates are subsequently forwarded to the respective funding agencies for review.

Approximately 80% of the syllabus is covered before the in-house tests, with the remaining portion completed between the tests and the final examinations. Answer scripts from mid-term tests are returned to students, enabling them to identify and address their weaknesses.

The college also ensures the integration of ICT tools into the teaching process, offering facilities like PowerPoint presentations, smart boards, and audiovisual aids to enhance classroom engagement. Additionally, students are encouraged to utilize a range of resources, including books, e-journals, and online materials available through the NPTEL portal and the library, to support and deepen their learning experience.

In addition to the lecture rooms, it has fully furnished Computer Labs, Music Rooms, Home Science and Fashion Designing Laboratories, Science Labs, Geography Labs, a Travel Tourism Lab, a Psychology Lab and a Virtual Library, Studios for Fine Arts, Commercial Art, Photography and Design. A separate block dedicated to design includes facilities such as a Textile Lab, a Fashion Lab, an Interior Lab, a Studios, a Shoppe, a Dark Room, a Video Production Studio, an Audio Production Studio, a Still Photography Lab and Studio, Art

Galleries, Multimedia Labs, a Jewellery Studio and Manufacturing Lab, a Seminar Room, Open-Air Theatre, a Hi-tech Language Lab, an Aviation Lab, and an aesthetically designed Cosmetology Labs. The college provides hostel accommodation for up to 500 students. Its library operates on an open-access system and offers reprographic facilities. There are spacious reading rooms exclusively for students. The college's auditorium, Urvi, with a seating capacity of 1200, serves as the hub for academic, co-academic, and cultural activities such as conferences, orientation camps, and annual functions. Furthermore, the college is equipped with an Indoor Stadium, a Swimming pool, an Indoor Gym, and an Outdoor Gym to meet the needs of sportswomen.

As part of its strategic plan for social outreach and environmental enrichment, the college has made a profound impact through its initiatives under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan. The college functions under a hierarchical governance structure. At the apex, the DAV College Managing Committee (DAVCMC) in New Delhi oversees the institution's overall operations. Locally, the Local Managing Committee, headed by the Chairman, supervises academic planning and developmental initiatives.

Within the college, administrative responsibilities are led by the Principal, supported by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). Additional administrative roles are managed by the Deans, the Hostel Warden, the Superintendents of the General Office and Accounts Office, and the Estate Officer. Academic decisions are overseen by the Heads of Departments (HODs).

A variety of societies, clubs, and committees, composed of teaching and non-teaching staff as well as students, organize academic, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities. The college strictly adheres to the rules and regulations set by the University Grants Commission (UGC), the Department of Public Instruction (Colleges) of the Government of Punjab, Guru Nanak Dev University (GNDU) in Amritsar, and DAVCMC, New Delhi, in matters of promotions, appointments, and service rules.

For filling vacant grant-in-aid faculty positions and posts in self-financed courses, DAVCMC advertises and oversees the selection process. Contractual faculty appointments for one year are made by a college-level panel appointed by DAVCMC, adhering to established norms. Vacancies in non-teaching and support staff positions are filled at the college level in compliance with guidelines from DAVCMC and the Department of Public Instruction (Colleges), Government of Punjab.

Internal financial audits:

The college offers several self-financed courses in addition to government-aided courses. The budget for self-financed courses is approved by the local committee and then by the parent governing body, DAVCMC, New Delhi. Additionally, the accounts

for self-financed courses are reconciled annually in June at DAVCMC, New Delhi. Moreover, the parent body, DAVCMC, New Delhi, sanctions all expenditures on major projects.

External financial audits:

External financial audits involve the two distinct categories:

External audit of funds received from the Government of Punjab:

The Government of Punjab oversees external audits of government funds at two key levels:

- Finance Department of the Government of Punjab
- Accountant General DPI (Colleges)

Additionally, funds designated for SC/ST students undergo scrutiny by either the Finance Department or a government-appointed committee. Furthermore, the DPI (Colleges) conducts compliance audits to verify adherence to administrative rules, leave rules, recruitment rules, and payments to retired faculty/staff.

External audit of funds received from national funding agencies:

Chartered Accountant audits the utilization of funds received from government funding agencies such as the UGC, DST, and DBT. The audited Utilization Certificates are subsequently forwarded to the respective funding agencies for review.

- Computer labs are utilised by the general office for administrative purposes and by different departments for academic purposes.

- Organizing career counseling sessions in the schools of the identified catchment areas.
