

At a glorious 58, BBK DAV College for Women stands tall as a provider of Quality Higher Education on the national horizon. With an invigorating ambience, state-of-the-art infrastructure and a committed and competent faculty, the college is ceaselessly striving to produce a workforce of the highest international standards. Impeccable in ethics and peerless in professionalism, the college offers a wide variety of programmes in consonance with the fast-changing world of today. Re-accredited with 'A' grade by NAAC, adjudged College with Potential for Excellence & as 'Star College' - Status conferred by Dept. of Biotechnology, Govt. of India, and acknowledged as Model College for Vocational Education by UGC and acclaimed as a sterling example of holistic education by NUEPA (National University of Educational Planning and Administration), BBK DAV College for Women, Amritsar, is a top-ranking college of North India. In sync with the fast-moving times, the college is committed to providing the best combination of ancient Indian values and modern science and technology.

Nurtured by an ideal combination of facilities and facilitators, the college scholars, sports persons and artists have been winning the highest honours in their fields of interest. College won Overall General Runners-up Sports Trophy (2023-24). Our 34 outstanding players won a huge amount of Rs.14,00,000/- (Fourteen Lac only) from Guru Nanak Dev University for their tremendous performance at international and intervarsity level. International Cyclists Ms. Agashe Sushikala Durgaprasad and Ms. Danole Pooja Baban got a cash prize of Rs. 6,00,000 (Six Lac) and Rs. 2,00,000 (Two Lac) respectively among women players.

In all the fields of cultural activity, the college artists remain at the forefront. In the Inter-Zonal Youth Festival of GNDU held in 2024, the college's participants won 1st position in 5 events, 2nd position in 5 events and 3rd position in 8 events. The college also bagged Overall Fine Arts Runners-Up Trophy 2024 in Inter-Zonal Youth Festival. In Zonal Youth Festival of GNDU, the college participants won 1st position in 3 events, 2nd position in 2 events and 3rd position in 6 events. Kritika Rajput (BFA, Semester-8) won first position in on-the-spot Painting competition, and Nandini (B. Voc. Entertainment, Semester-4) won fifth position in the Mehndi competition at the 38th AIU Inter-University North Zone Youth Festival held at Panjab University, Chandigarh. Kritika Rajput (BFA, Semester-8) won second position in on-the-spot Painting competition at 38th Inter University National Youth Festival held at Amity University, Noida.

The college NCC and NSS units have been decorated with the highest honours. Our cadets have won the honour of commanding the NCC contingent at the Republic Day parade in New Delhi. In this session, NCC and NSS cadets of the college zealously participated in various state level and national level activities to create awareness in society on the burning issues. The college takes genuine pride in pursuing its community service programmes and extensive activities most vigorously. To broaden the student's horizons, the college provides them with abundant exposure through various seminars, guest lectures, exhibitions, etc.

GENDER SENSITIZATION



INFRASTRUCTURE



The college has made efforts to create an invigorating ambiance and a sound support system conducive to the all-round development of students. IT Infrastructure

The college is equipped with learning facilitators & gadgets ranging from Multimedia Projectors, Slide Projectors, Xerox Machines, TV, DVD & Audio Players, Smart Boards, and learning resources. To meet the demands of Computer & IT-related courses, the college has a Techno-Centre with eighteen state-of-the-art computer labs interconnected through Local Area Network with an optical fiber backbone. The Network Resource Centre is equipped with Windows Servers, pfSense firewall/gateway/router, licensed software, and a wide range of the latest gadgets. The campus has around 450 computers with Internet facility and the latest printers, scanners, and configurations to meet the needs of the students. The campus is also equipped with a Wi-Fi facility.

INFRASTRUCTURE



College Library

The richly stacked fully air-conditioned college library, housed in an imposing, well-lit, and ventilated building, is the hub of activity all through the year. With 73,007 books, 13 national & international print journals, 75 magazines, and 12 newspapers, the fully computerized library functions on open access system, augmented by a reprographic facility. It has commodious reading rooms exclusively for members of the Scholars Club, for honours and postgraduate students, and for the faculty. Every year the college spends lacs of rupees on books and journals, this being an area of top priority for the college. The college has access to 1,99,500+ e-books and 6000+ e-journals of various disciplines like Arts, Social Sciences, Life Sciences, Information Sciences, literature, etc. through the N-LIST programme. The college also has departmental libraries, a virtal library and a CD library.

College Hostel

Equipped with all the modern amenities, the college hostel is a home outside the home to its lodgers/boarders. A centrally-air-cooled reception-cum-lounge, rooms with attached bathrooms, a well-equipped study center with computer and internet facility, library, well-groomed lawns, healthy and nutritious food, air-conditioned rooms for students, RO water purifying systems, water heating system and 24-hour power supply and generator facility are some of the salient features of the hostel.

Infrastructure for Co-Curricular Activities

The college has built a huge, state-of-the-art auditorium with a seating capacity of 1200, with green rooms, washrooms, light control rooms, stores for costumes and stage property, etc. The college auditorium is abuzz with cultural activities around the year, while its huge foyer serves as a space for rehearsals & exhibitions. The Design Department houses an Open Air Theatre to hold solo and group dances, costume shows, and art & design workshops. Youth Welfare Department, music & dance rooms for training in performing arts, art galleries and open spaces for mural work, exhibition halls & display windows, cater to the creative and artistic needs of the students. Heritage Centre with its collection of Punjabi Folk Art and Culture lends a unique ambiance to the campus.

Infrastructure for Sports

To improve the quality of players and to produce players of high caliber at the national and international level, the college has well-maintained grounds for various open-air games such as cricket, hockey, basketball, volleyball, handball, kho-kho, fencing, archery, lawn-tennis, indoor shooting range, etc. One College bus remains at the disposal of sports students round the clock to ferry them to various training centres. PARENTS MUST ENSURE THAT THEIR WARD:

- Attends at least 75% of the lectures delivered. They check lecture shortage from the college office, at the end of each term.
- Regularly visits the library.
- Reads all the notices/circulars put up at the Information Centre.
- The parents & the students are required to go through the Prospectus carefully before signing the Admission Form. Once the form is signed, the total responsibility of having read the rules and regulations shall lie upon the parents and the students and they shall be bound by the same.
- Attendance in the HOUSE TESTS conducted by the college is compulsory and the student must attain the required pass percentage of marks. The college will take strict disciplinary action against a student, who is absent in the House Tests. However, the Principal may suspend punitive action in extraordinary circumstances.

PARENTS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR TRANSPORT ARRANGEMENTS

The college is located in the heart of the city. Public transport is easily available from neighbouring villages. However, college will not be held responsible for any transport arrangement made by parents/students.

STUDENTS SHALL NOT BE ALLOWED TO LEAVE THE CAMPUS BEFORE 12 NOON.

ELIGIBILITY FOR UNIVERSITY EXAMINATIONS

The students are required to fulfill the following eligibility conditions for appearing in the final examinations of GNDU:

- a) Get 25 percent marks in aggregate of all the subjects or 35 percent marks in each subject in the House Test.
- b) Attend 75 percent of the total lectures delivered in each of the subjects taken by them, including theory and practical. Condonation of shortage of lectures, up to 15 percent of lectures attended, is Principal's discretion and not a student's right.
- c) Clear all the dues of the college.

In case they fail to fulfill any of these conditions, they shall be detained from appearing in the final examinations of GNDU. It is the responsibility of the students to apprise their parents of all the rules and regulations.

As per the directions of the High Court, students should not travel in any unsafe vehicle like truck/tractor in their own interest. They are further advised to strictly observe traffic rules & wear helmets.

Guidelines for Persons with Disabilities Students:

In line with the UGC guidelines and the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016, our institution is committed to ensuring an inclusive and accessible learning environment.

The following provisions are available for students with disabilities:

I. Barrier-free campus:

The campus is equipped with ramps, lifts and accessible toilets to ensure smooth mobility.

II. Academic and Examination Support:

Facilities scribes, readers and extra time during examinations are provided upon request with the prior approval. Teaching materials are made available if needed.

III. Counselling and Mentorship:

Faculty members counsel and mentor to support the academic and emotional well-being of PWD Students.

IV. Library Staff Support:

Trained Library Staff is available to assist students in locating and accessing materials. Reserved quiet reading zone is also available for PWD students. Wheel chair-accessible reading desks are available.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR STUDENTS

- Always carry your IDENTITY CARD, while in the college. No student
 will be allowed to enter the college premises without the identity
 card. Its loss shall entail heavy penalty besides the cost of a new
 Identity Card.
- Come to the college in proper uniform on Mondays. Uniform on Mondays is white dupatta, shirt and salwar. Design— round neck, straight fitting, half sleeves. Bottle green pullover/ cardigan, along with the uniform, is to be strictly adhered to, in winters.
- Wear decent dresses during the rest of the week. Suits or trousers with decent tops are allowed. Half pants, shorts, capris, sleeveless and short tops are not allowed.
- Don't litter the campus. Eatables are not allowed in the academic area and the auditorium.
- Don't scribble on the walls & the college property.
- Rush for the assembly as soon as the bell rings.
- Don't carry MOBILE PHONES in the college. Students using mobile phones in the college campus will be penalized and strict action will be taken.

- Visit the Information Centre daily and read all the notices.
- Maintain perfect silence in corridors.
- Attend 'HAVAN', as and when notified. A heavy fine (Rs.50 per day) will be levied for each absence.
- Don't honk the horn in the campus.
- Park your vehicles in proper parking lot and do not sit on the parked vehicles.
- Alight from the car, a little away from the main gate, if somebody comes to drop you, to allow smooth flow of traffic.
- Avoid keeping heavy cash & jewellery in your bag.
- Don't indulge in ragging. RAGGING IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED AND PUNISHABLE BY LAW.
- Switch off the fans and lights while leaving the classrooms. Be REGULAR & PUNCTUAL in classes.
- Make use of your free time in academic/co-curricular pursuits.
- Do not pluck flowers.
- Any student found guilty of misbehaviour/ disobedience shall be rusticated from the college.

Leave Rules

- A student should apply for leave from the college when it is absolutely necessary, on the printed form available from the college book shop.
- Nature and reason of leave and days on which it is required must be stated clearly in the leave form.
- Leave application must be endorsed by father/guardian of the student or by the Hostel Superintendent, in case of a boarder.
- All leaves other than for personal illness, duty, one's own marriage are regarded as casual.
- A student will be allowed only 10 casual leaves i.e. 5 in each semester. Even if leave beyond 10 days has been granted, excess leave will be automatically cancelled.

- Leave for a part of a day will be counted as full day for calculation of total leave.
- Sanctioning authority for leave up to 3 days is the teacher of General English and any leave for more than 3 days has to be got sanctioned from the principal/or her nominee.
- In case of long, serious illness or any accident, the Principal must be informed by the parents of the wards, along with a medical certificate on the day of its occurrence. It must be borne in mind that medical leave due to serious illness shall be considered towards condonation on merit of the case. ROUTINE MEDICAL CERTIFICATE SHALL NOT BE ENTERTAINED.
- No leave application during the House Tests will be entertained by anyone except Dean, Academics.

RAGGING IS A MENACE: CURB IT COMPLETELY

Ragging is banned in the college. The college has adopted the UGC regulations on curbing the menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009 as well as the directions of the Hon'ble Apex Court.

WHAT CONSTITUTES RAGGING?

Any disorderly conduct whether by words, spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing or mistreating, mishandling any other student, indulging in rowdy or indisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension in fresher or junior students or asking other students to do an act or perform something which students will not do in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of the fresher or the junior student.

Note: If a student is found guilty of ragging, she is liable to be punished appropriately including expulsion from the institution and /or imprisonment up to 3 years and / or a fine of Rs. 25,000. The punishment may also include

ADMISSION GUIDELINES



ELIGIBILITY CONDITIONS

- a) Those students who have passed the lower examination from some other board/university (other than Punjab University, Punjabi University and Punjab School Education Board) will have to obtain eligibility certificate from Guru Nanak Dev University within one month of admission
- b) Students have to fill eligibility form and submit in office with original DMC and migration certificate within one month of admission
 - a) Migration certificate from the University/Board concerned. (A student can apply for eligibility certificate even if she has not received migration certificate so far). Inter-college migration certificate is essentially required for the students migrating from any other college of GNDU.
 - b) Attested copy of entrance test card of selection list. (Only for those courses/classes where admission is based on entrance test).
 - c) Category certificate issued by Gazetted Officer (like SC/ST/BC) and Punjab Domicile Certificate/Residence Certificate.

Those students who have passed the lower examination from Punjabi/Punjab University or PSEB are exempted from obtaining eligibility certificate, but they have to submit all the above-mentioned original documents by the given dates.

Those students who have passed the lower examination i.e. intermediate from Bihar Intermediate Education Council, Patna will have to submit

Admit Card, Transfer/Character Certificate duly attested by DEO, from the college/school, issued by council, other than the above-mentioned certificates.

Those students who have passed SSC Part-II from National Open School, New Delhi, in four subjects (including English) and which is cleared within two years after matriculation, can be given provisional admission in BA/B Sc (Pass Courses). Such students will have to clear the remaining fifth subject within a particular group.

Syndicate in its meeting on 24-02-1997 has passed through para 89 - that the students who obtained the bachelor's degree before 1991 in the old (14 year) stream will be treated at par with (10+2+3) stream in pursuance of higher courses.

Students coming from other states will be allowed to take up Basic Punjabi or Punjab History & Culture in lieu of General Punjabi as per rules given in 33(6) of University calendar. For clarification, contact college office.

Foreign students would be given admission only if they have student visa, not on the basis of any other visa. They will have to submit a recognition certificate of the examination passed from Association of Indian Universities, Kotla Marg, New Delhi. This is mandatory for obtaining eligibility certificate. They will have to submit complete documents, including the details of student visa.

The information regarding boards/universities recognized by GNDU may be obtained from the college office.

Admission Procedure

Note: After University's odd semester examinations, the students must take admission immediately in even semester without waiting for their results.

Parents are required to read the Prospectus before signing the form.

Once the form is signed, the total responsibility of having read the rules and regulations, shall lie upon them.

The student should:

- · Purchase the Prospectus and read it carefully. Fill the form neatly and completely.
- · Get it signed from her parents/guardian.
- Get it checked from the Subject Verification Board.
- Subjects will be given on FIRST COME FIRST SERVED CUM MERIT basis, and as per availability.
- Students who have been on the rolls in the previous year will lose their claim, on late arrival.
- · Admitted students will pay the fee at the fee counter on the same day and submit the form at the same counter.
- In case of delay in the payment of fees, the form will need re-validation by the incharge of Admission Board.
- · Subjects taken may be changed the next day, provided seats are available.
- Submit the photographs in the office to collect the identity card. Students are required to deposit 4 coloured photographs.
- · It is mandatory for all students to get themselves enrolled online also (as per dates prescribed by GNDU).
- Any student taking admission in the college will also register herself and apply for admission on Punjab Govt.'s Online Admission Portal and her admission will be considered on the same date when she is admitted on the online portal.
- $\bullet \ \ For admission in Sem-II, IV, VI \& VIII, the student must have Hall ticket of Sem-I, III, V \& VII respectively.$

Ordinance under Credit Based Grading System (CBGS)

In order to enhance the quality of education, Guru Nanak Dev University introduced in its curricula Credit-Based Grading System (CBGS). The curriculum in a given subject would include such contents as may be required to upgrade the standards of teaching such as classroom lectures, laboratory techniques, seminars, field study, assignments, discussions, project and training etc. These contents would be specified in terms of courses, with each course having credits depending on the contact hours it involves.

1. Semester System

The academic programmes shall be based on semester system:

Odd semester: July to December Even semester: January to June

2. Eligibility for Admission and duration of the courses

The Eligibility and duration of the courses shall be as prescribed by the University from time to time.

3. Fee/Funds

The candidate shall pay such fee/funds to the University/Institution as may be prescribed by the University/Institution from time to time.

4. Scheme of Instructions-Examination

For each examination, every student admitted to the programme under the semester system must be on the rolls of the institution, and shall send his/her fees detail for the examination through the Principal/Head of the Institution. In case of Private student, he/she must submit his/her admission form (for first semester only) along with the examination fee and required certificate for eligibility to the concerned examination branch.

- a) For Regular student:
- i. Attendance requirement for appearing in the examination is atleast 75% of the total number of lectures delivered in each theory and practical paper separately. Deficiency in lectures may be condoned as per ordinances (Chapter 15 (ii) of University calendar, Vol. II). If in a particular semester, a student falls short of attendance in a maximum of two papers, he/she would be permitted to appear in the semester examination of the papers in which he/she fulfils the attendance requirements. The paper/s in which the student does not fulfill the minimum attendance requirements, he/she shall not be permitted to appear in the semester examination of such paper/s, and shall be declared as having failed in such paper/s. A student who is falling short of attendance in maximum of two papers, he/she shall be required to attend the minimum number of lectures which were falling short, during next year when the paper/s is/are offered.
- ii. In case of private student: Wherever required, he/she will submit his/her 75% attendance lecture certificate to the concerned examination branch.

5. Syllabi and mode of evaluation

The syllabi, courses of reading and regulations for the courses shall be notified by the University from time to time, and shall be deemed to constitute integral part of the Ordinances. Course evaluation under the semester system of evaluation shall be done on marks basis and thereafter will be converted into grades. If a subject has multiple theory and/or practical papers, the student will be required to pass all the papers separately. However, if the student fails in any of the papers of that subject and has passed other papers of that subject, he/she will be required to clear that paper only.

6. Carry on system for various semester examinations.

I. Courses having two semester duration:

- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester provided that he/she fulfills all requirements under the prevailing ordinances and has been issued Roll number for first semester examination.
- b. For certificate courses/UG/PG Diploma In case a student fails to pass all the courses/papers within a period of two semesters (One Year), he/she shall be given two consecutive semesters (one year) more to pass.
- c. For one year degree course- In case a student fails to pass all the

courses/papers within a period of two semesters (One Year), he/she shall be given two years more to pass.

- II. Courses having four semester duration:
- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester provided that he/she fulfills all requirements under the prevailing ordinances and has been issued Roll number for first semester examination.
- b. However, the student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/ papers of the first two semesters.
- c. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from third semester to fourth semester.
- d. In case a student fails to pass all the courses/papers within a period of four semesters (Two Years), he/ she shall be given four consecutive semesters (Two Years) more to pass.
- III. Courses having six semester duration:
- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester provided that he/she fulfills all requirements under the prevailing ordinances and has been issued Roll number for first semester examination.
- b. However, the student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed atleast 50% courses/ papers of the first two semesters
- c. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from third semester to fourth semester.
- d. However, a student shall be promoted to fifth semester only if he/she has passed atleast 50% courses/ papers of the first four semesters.
- e. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from fifth semester to sixth semester. After a period of six semesters the student shall be given a period of two consecutive years to pass.

 $IV. \ Courses \ having \ eight semester \ duration:$

- a. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester provided that he/she fulfills all requirements under the prevailing ordinances and has been issued Roll number for first semester examination.
- b. A student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed atleast 50% courses/papers of the first two semesters, but there will be no condition for promoting a student from third semester to fourth semester.
- c. A student shall be promoted to fifth semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/papers of the first four semesters.
- d. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from fifth semester to sixth semester.
- e. A student shall be promoted to seventh semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/ papers of the first six semesters.
- f. There will be no condition for promoting a student from seventh semester to eight semester and after a period of eight semesters, the student shall be given a period of two consecutive years to pass.
- VIII. Regular students admitted to a course shall register/enroll themselves with the university in the very first semester of their programme and pay prescribed fee to the college/ University. Direct admission to second semester is not allowed. The same rule shall apply to private and capacity enhancement programme students.

The above shall also apply to all such courses in which admission to a college is a prerequisite as a regular student.

The above provision is extended to all the Under Graduate, Post Graduate Courses & Diplomas. This provision shall also be extended for subsequent semesters.

7. Course Credit

Each course shall have a certain number of credits assigned to it depending upon the academic load of the course assessed on the basis of weekly contact hours of lecture, tutorial and laboratory classes, assignments or field study and/or self-study.

Generally, each course shall have an integer number of credits reflecting its weightage. The number of credits of a course in a semester shall ordinarily be calculated as under:

8. Grading System

The Grading will follow Credit-Based System, the details of which are given below:

While undertaking the course work, the following terms are defined:

'Course' means a paper. 'Credit' means weightage assigned to a course 'Grade' means a letter grade assigned to a student on a 10-point scale.

9. Award of Grace Marks

A candidate who appears in all the subjects of an examination and who fails in one or more subjects shall be given grace marks upto a maximum of one percent (1%) of the total aggregate marks (excluding marks for internal assessment) to make up the deficiency, if by such addition the candidate can pass such subject(s).

A candidate who re-appears to clear the compartment or subject(s) or part(s) in which he has been declared to re-appear shall be awarded grace marks upto One percent (1%) of the total marks of the subject(s) or part(s) in which he re-appears if by such addition the candidate can pass in that subject(s) or part(s).

10. Conversion from CGPA to Percentage:

A CGPA of 6 will be considered equivalent to 60% marks. The conversion of CGPA to Percent Score will be carried out by multiplication of respective CGPA by a factor of 10. The equivalence between selected percentages in absolute marks system and CGPA is as follows.

11. Minimum Credits & Minimum CGPA required for a degree

The number of credits assigned to a particular course in which a student has obtained 'P' (minimum passing grade for a course) grade or higher shall be counted as Credits earned by him/her. A student shall have to earn a minimum of such number of Credits as may be required for the award of a degree in a particular programme. A student, who has obtained a minimum CGPA of 4 and earned a minimum number of Credits as per scheme as specified for the programme, shall be eligible for the award of the respective degree.

12. Promotion Rules

a) A student getting 'F' grade in any paper will be treated as having failed in that paper. If he/she fails in a paper/s, he/she will have to repeat the paper/s and will have to obtain at least 'P' grade in that paper/s within the maximum period of the programme as defined above in Table-1 to complete the degree for that programme.

b) A student who does not complete the programme of study within the minimum duration of the course of his/her study, or gets 'F' grade in

any paper/s shall not be eligible for any merit position/medal/award of the University.

c) If a student fails in more than 50% of the papers at the end of the even semester of each academic session during all the preceding semesters taken together, he/she will be declared as having failed in that particular year and will have to seek readmission in the odd semester of that particular year of the degree. However, in the final semester (where promotion to the next academic session is not applicable), the result of the final semester examination will be declared only if the candidate has passed all the preceding semester examinations. If the candidate has passed all the preceding semester examinations and failed in one or more papers of final semester only, then his/her result of final semester shall be declared as having failed in such paper/s and he/she will have to repeat the paper/s and will have to obtain at least 'P' grade in that paper/s within the maximum period defined above in Table-1 to complete the degree for that programme.

d) In the case of regular students, after appearing in the first semester, if a candidate is unable to take the admission in any of the next even/odd semester of their course, then the candidate shall be required to seek admission into that missed semester examination as a regular candidate after the last semester of the programme, but within maximum time allowed to complete that degree programme as per Table-1 above, provided that he/she fulfills all the other requirements under the prevailing ordinances. This rule will also be applicable on those private candidates who have taken subjects with practical component, where 75% lectures attendance is required.

e) The private full subjects' candidates who have opted for non-practical subjects in which 75% lectures attendance condition is not required, may be allowed to appear in one missed semester along with higher semester examination; even semester examination with even semester and odd semester examination with odd semester with a special fee of Rs.5000/- or as prescribed by the University from time to time.

f) Special chance/ Special chance under medical grounds may be given as per University Norms prescribed from time to time.

Notes:

1. Failing students shall appear in the examination in the regular semester examinations next year i.e., reappear of examination for an odd semester shall be conducted alongwith the next odd semester, and even semester alongwith the next even semester and there shall be no special supplementary examinations.

2. If 50% of the courses/papers required to pass involve a fraction, the fraction of the course/paper will be treated as a full course. For example, if in a year there are 13 courses/papers in two semesters, the candidate will be required to pass minimum of 7 courses/papers.

3. A candidate is allowed to enroll in two academic programmes at the same time, with one being in full-time physical mode and the other in Open and Distance Learning (ODL) or Online mode.

4. Candidates applying for two academic programmes, the submission of a migration certificate is mandatory for the programme joined earlier or programme joined in physical mode from Guru Nanak Dev University. However, for the second programme, migration certificate is not requisite; instead, the candidate is obligated to submit an undertaking to the Institution/University at the time of admission.

Submission of migration certificate is not required for programme under online mode

5. Admission to a programme will be based on fulfilling the required eligibility conditions for that programme.

6. The clauses which are not covered under these Common Ordinances be read with their respective Ordinances and other general rules.

7. Clauses relating to medium of instructions, duration of courses, eligibility, re-appear etc. which have not been mentioned under the new Common Ordinances will remain the same as per the previous ordinances.

8. In case of special/ unavoidable circumstances, the competent authority may exempt what is stated in these Ordinances.



Non-domicile students may opt for Basic Punjabi or Punjab History & Culture in lieu of Compulsory Punjabi.

If a student pursues the three year degree course for the 4th year, she will be awarded Honours Degree.



RULES

NCC now is of three years duration & the cadets are required to attend one camp for B Certificate Exam and two camps for C Certificate Exam. Students enrolled under NCC are also required to attend 40 parades in a session, as per schedule, notified by the college. NCC cadets must collect their uniform from the NCC store at the beginning of the session and attend the parades regularly.

INCENTIVES & WEIGHTAGE

The college provides liberal fee concessions and cash awards to outstanding NCC cadets, other than the following incentives:

A weightage of 5 percent on the aggregate marks is given in Nursing Courses and B. Ed.

Awards and Scholarships for NCC cadets of categories A, B & Care mentioned below: -

Category (A)

Participation in RDC, or Youth Exchange Programe (only university fee charges).

Category (B)

- a) Selection in ALC, BLC, NIC, Mountaineering, Vayu Sainik Camp, Thal Sainik Camp National Competitions, Gold Medalists and outstanding cadets. Fee Concession worth Rs.3,500 per year.
- b) Selection in Pre BLC, DCATC-I, DCATC-II, DCATA-III, Marksmanship, Trekking Camp. Fee concession worth Rs.2,500 per year.

Category (C)

Military Attachment Camp, Army Attachment Camp, Air Force Attachment Camp, ATC + Regular in NCC Parades, RDC (Gandhi Ground), any other Local Level Camp. Fee concession worth Rs. 1,000 per year.

Under Cadets Welfare Society Scholarship, 1,000 scholarships of Rs.6,000 each is given to the cadets. Awards for Best Cadet with a cash prize of Rs.4,500 and CM & Governor Awards with a cash prize of Rs.3,000 are given to the deserving cadets.

Job Opportunities: Preference is given to NCC cadets in recruitment to State Police Force, Paramilitary Forces, Army, Air & Naval Wing.

Adventure Opportunities: Cadets visit places in India during Trekking, Rock Climbing, Mountaineering, All India Leadership Training & Republic Day Camps.

Youth Exchange Programme: Students are sent to different states of India and abroad under this programme.

Trained on a rigorous regimen and supported by excellent infrastructure, coaching facilities, fee concession and more, the college sportswomen remain in the limelight throughout the year. The college has made tremendous contribution to university sports, adding a major share to Guru Nanak Dev University's' exceptional feat of winning Maulana Abul Kalam Azad All India Trophy for Sports. College won Overall General Runners-Up Sports Trophy 2023-24. Our outstanding players won a huge amount of Rs. 14, 00,000/- (Fourteen Lac only) from Guru Nanak Dev University for their magnificent performance at international as well as intervarsity level and *Khelo* India University Games.

National Achievements

FINANCIAL AID FOR SCHEDULED CASTE

No fees and funds would be charged from the students of scheduled caste category as part of Post Matric Scholarship Scheme (conditions apply). Special scholarships for girl students under the Government of India Post Matric Scholarship Scheme, are available to those scheduled caste/tribe students who are permanently settled in Punjab State and are pursuing post matriculation studies. The annual family income from all the sources should not exceed Rs.2,50,000 in any case. Backward Class Stipend is given to the student, whose parents' annual income does not exceed Rs.1,00,000.
